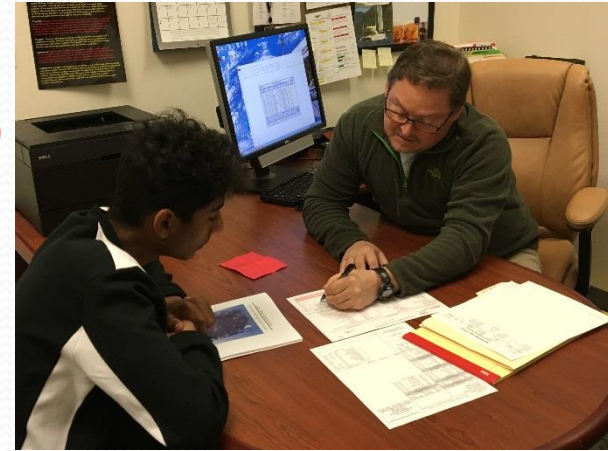

High School Graduation...



...IT WILL BE HERE BEFORE YOU KNOW IT.

I.U.S.D. Graduation Requirements:

- All students must earn a minimum of 215 credits
- All students must complete academic subject requirements including English, Math, Social Science, World Language or Visual/Performing Arts, Science, Health and Physical Education.



IUSD Minimum High School Graduation Requirements:

- 40 credits English
- 20 credits of Math to include Math I
- 20 credits Science
- 10 credits World History
- 10 credits US History
- 5 credits Political Science/ 5 credits Economics
- 10 credits of World Language or Visual/Performing Art/Career Technical Education
- 20 credits Physical Education
- 5 credits of Health
- Additional elective courses to total **215 credits**

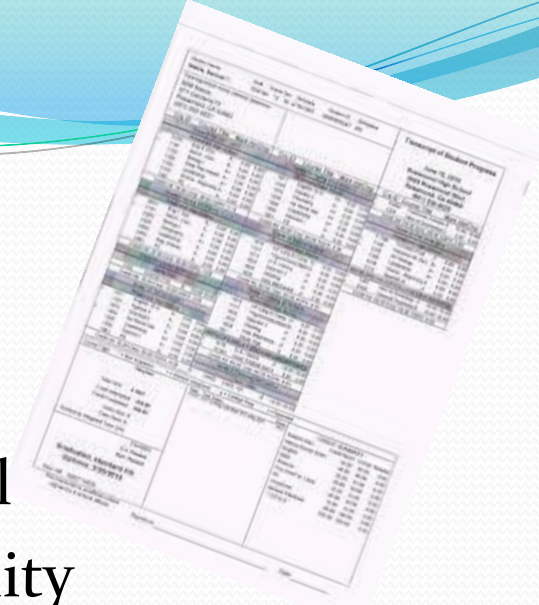
Transcript Review:

- You can print an unofficial copy of your student's transcript at my.iusd.org (parent portal)
- Get in the habit of checking the “**graduation status**” tab to see what high school graduation requirements remain.
- Students should check their transcript each semester to make sure it is accurate!
- Courses used to meet IUSD graduation requirements must be taken within IUSD (WHS / IUSD summer school / IUSD blended learning).
- Courses used to meet college entrance requirements or for personal enrichment can be taken elsewhere (online, community colleges...) at the student/family discretion but the course and grade will not be placed on the WHS transcript.



Repeating Classes

- Review your child's transcript on Parent Portal
- Ds may need to be repeated for college eligibility
- Fs may need to be repeated to meet high school graduation requirements
- Discuss options for repeating courses with your counselor
- Courses for which your child earns a grade of C or better should not be repeated; the higher grade won't count!
- Credit will not be issued twice for most repeated courses.

Scheduling News:

Course registration for 2020-2021:

- **February 20th or 21st** : your students will be receiving 2020-2021 course selection materials through English classes. Your student's Spring semester teachers will be signing off on course recommendations prior to registration.

Counselors will be available **during lunch** to answer 9th grade student scheduling questions. Feel free to email your student's assigned counselor if *you* have questions about course selection.

- **Feb 27th through March 3rd**: Counselors will be meeting briefly with 9th graders to enter their course selections during Science courses (Living Earth, H. Living Earth).

Summer school course registration for 2020:

IUSD summer school courses are mostly for remediation of "D" or "F" grades. Some courses such as Health, PE, and art are also available.

Course information and registration details will be announced toward the end of March / beginning of April. Check the WHS website.

Post High School Options...

Start thinking about options now

- Attend community college
- Attend a 4 year college/university /art college
- Full-time employment
- Apprenticeships
- Technical or trade Schools
- Military
- Gap year a chance to gain work experience, some want to see the world, and others just want to feel a little more ready to head to college.



California Community Colleges

The Good News...

- 112 community colleges, in 71 districts make the CCC system the largest system of higher education in the world.
- CCC train 70% of California's nurses and 80% of the firefighters, police officers and emergency medical technicians.
- CCC transfer students comprise 28% of the UC graduates and 54% of the CSU graduates; **1/3 of 2018-2019 undergraduates at UCLA transferred from California community colleges.**

The Not So Good News...

- Of those who enter the CCC needing one level below college math, only 46.2% achieve that certificate, degree or transfer.
- Over 70% enter the CCC under prepared to do college level work.



What does all that mean for my child?

“I’m only going to IVC so my high school classes / grades / study skills don’t matter. I’ll start getting serious when I get to college”

- Even students planning to attend a CCC and transfer to a 4 year university should treat their high school experience as college preparatory by:
 - Working to refine organization and study skills
 - Taking a-g courses (math every year)
 - Taking AP and Honors courses as appropriate.



California Community Colleges

The CCC offer three programs:

- **Two year Degrees:** A.A., AA-T or A.S, AS-T
- **Certificate Programs:** A variety of career areas
- **Transfer Program:** to Four Year Colleges

(adegreewithaguarantee.com) => transfer to CSU

IGETC / TAG / TAP => transfer to UC

The cost of attending a California Community College while living at home is approximately \$2500 per year for tuition, books and supplies (assuming a 12 unit schedule). Financial aid and other financial programs including the IVC “Promise Program” are available.

To enroll at a California Community College, a student must be 18 years old or have earned a high school diploma.

University Entrance requirements



UC/CSU a-g Course Requirements:

- a. **History/Social Science:** Two years to include 1 year of American Studies (US History or Amer. Government), plus 1 year of World Studies

- b. **English:** Four years UC/CSU approved English

- c. **Math:** Three years including at least Math I, Math II and Math III (four years are *strongly* recommended)

- d. **Science:** Two years required, (3 *strongly* recommended)
 - 1st year lab science = **Living Earth or H. Living Earth**
 - 2nd year lab science = **Chem. I.E.S or H. Chem I.E.S**



UC/CSU a-g Course Requirements, continued:

- e. **2 years (3 or more recommended) of a language** other than English (World Language); or SAT Subject Test in Foreign Language; or AP test in Foreign Language; or statement of competency from a University language department on official letterhead.

- f. **1 year of Visual/Performing Arts (VPA)** in a single discipline or transferrable community college course.

- g. **College Prep. Electives – 1 year min.** (Economics, Psychology, Sociology, AP Human Geography, Cultures In a Global Age, & other academic electives including courses beyond the minimum required in other academic areas.)



California State Universities (CSU) calstate.edu

- 23 campuses state-wide
- Minimum GPA: 2.0
- SAT or ACT required (writing section not required)
- Listing of extra curricular activities and essay not part of the regular application. Some campuses are more selective than others.
- Tuition: approximately \$7,500 per year (doesn't include fees, housing, books, etc. and is subject to increase)
- Application Period: October 1 – November 30 of 12th grade year.



University of California (UC)

- Nine undergraduate campuses state-wide:

- UC Berkeley (Cal)
- UC Davis
- UC Irvine
- UCLA (Los Angeles)
- UC Merced
- UC Riverside
- UC San Diego
- UC Santa Barbara

- Minimum 3.0 GPA
- SAT with writing or ACT with writing required
- Comprehensive Review includes extracurricular experiences, leadership, awards, as well as 4 personal insight question responses
- Some campuses are more selective than others
- Tuition and fees: approximately \$13,900 per year - subject to increase
- Application Period **Nov. 1st – Nov. 30th** of 12th grade year



Who receives guaranteed admission to the University of California (ELC)?

- Within the pool of applicants, two categories of students will be guaranteed admission *somewhere* in the UC system:
 1. those who fall in the top 9 percent of all high school graduates statewide
 2. those who rank in the top 9 percent of their own high school graduating class – WHS class of 2019 = 4.3 GPA
- Because selectivity varies by campus due to the size and academic quality of applicant pools, a student's chance for admission will also vary by campus. For this reason, it is important for students to review all of their options and choose both carefully and broadly.



Private and Out of State Colleges

- Entrance requirements are usually similar to CSU/UC
- Plan ahead: Visit websites of private and out of state colleges to determine admission requirements

Where did WHS class of 2019 go?

- 21% attend the University of California (+7% from 2018)
- 10% attend Cal State Universities
- 15% attend Private Universities
- 6% attend an out of state public university
- 44% attend a community college or technical school
- 1% attend international universities
- 3% Other: military, work, gap year, or undecided

Time for a quiz:

- This college boasts a 60-70% medical school acceptance rate, well above the national average.

- The school was also noted as a "best buy" college school by the Fiske Guide to Colleges.

- **Sacramento State's Construction Management** Program boasts a near 100% employment rate. Students earning a bachelors degree will also complete a minor in business administration. (3.25, 951 average SAT CR & M)
- **University of Washington, Bothell** was rated #37 among all schools in the nation and #10 of all public universities in terms of educational quality, affordability and alumni earnings by Money Magazine. (average GPA 3.3)
- **Cal Poly Pomona's** highly ranked Collins College of Hospitality Management is the 4th largest hospitality program in the country and boasts an 86% employment rate. (3.83, 1224 SAT, 26 ACT)



Paying for Higher Education: Financial Aid

“Financial aid is available to assist students and families in meeting the costs of a college education. If you need help paying for fees, books, and other expenses, you should apply for financial aid. - www.icanaffordcollege.com

Cost of Attendance minus (-) Expected Family Contribution = Financial Need

Information about your family’s financial situation gathered from FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) available in October of 12th grade will be used to determine your family’s “expected contribution”. Colleges will create packages in the form of a student aid report (SAR) to include applicable *grants* / *scholarships*, *work study* opportunities and *loans* which can be used to fill the “financial need” gap.

- If you already created an account, the code in this week’s email will be missing. If you haven’t created an account, use the registration code to create one and link onto your student’s account.

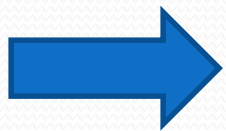
