### What is Matriculation?

Matriculation refers to the application process, which includes:

- 1. Apply (fill out application)
- 2. Complete the Self Placement (MySite)
- 3. Submit transcripts
- 4. Advisement
- 5. First Semester Plan
- 6. Orientation
- 7. FAFSA or CA Dream Act

Current high school seniors can apply to IVC for the

upcoming fall semester starting on October 1!

#### **IVC Freshman Advantage**

Freshman advantage is designed for new students to give them the opportunity to receive an early registration time and enroll in courses ahead of most currently enrolled IVC students.

Who can apply for Freshman Advantage?

- 1. First time college student (no prior college attendance at IVC or any other institution)
- 2. Complete Matriculation Steps 1-7 by May 9, 2023

#### **IVC Promise Program**

Irvine Valley Promise Program provides two years of free tuition (enrollment fees) for eligible, first-time, full-time IVC students.

To be eligible, students must be:

- 1. First-time college student
- 2. California resident or eligible for residency waiver (AB540)
- 3. Enrolled in at least 12 units
- 4. Complete Financial Aid Application
- 5. Complete by Matriculation Steps 1-7 by May 9, 2023

Along with a free 2 years, Irvine Valley Promise provides:

- 1. Bookstore vouchers
- 2. Counseling services
- 3. Academic/career resources to help students be successful

#### **Honors Program**

**The Irvine Valley College Honors Program** provides a supportive learning community that nurtures academic, professional, and personal growth in highly motivated students from all backgrounds. The program offers eligible students access to many opportunities including small seminar style honors classes, enriched coursework, leadership opportunities and more!

To apply, students must demonstrate a **GPA of 3.25** or better on an official transcript beginning with 9th grade and including senior year.

Students must also submit three items of academic or creative work that demonstrates academic potential and upload a personal essay within the application.

Freshman wanting priority registration for the fall semester must submit their application by April 1.

#### **IVC Workshops at WHS**

Woodbridge High School will be hosting IVC application workshops with Matriculation Specialists throughout the year!

These workshops will assist students with successfully completing steps 1-7 of the application process.

#### What does "highly selective" really mean?

#### **University of California Entrance Requirements**

**I. Subject Requirement**: Freshman applicants are required to complete a <u>minimum</u> of 15 year long "a-g" courses in grades 9-12. Seven of these courses must be taken in the last two years of high school. Seniors will <u>self report</u> all classes and grades on their application.

#### **UC Requirements Continued...**

**II. Scholarship Requirement:** A minimum 3.0 GPA is required for CA residents, 3.4 GPA for non resident applicants. All classes used to meet entrance requirements must be completed with a "C-" / "P" or higher. "P" grades are not used in the GPA calculation.

#### UC Campuses may consider:

- Unweighted GPA
- Weighted capped "UC GPA"
- Fully Weighted GPA

**The Examination Requirement:** UC <u>will not</u> use SAT /ACT information in admission decisions. Students may choose to report test scores, including ACT/ SAT I, SAT II and AP scores, which the UC can use for course placement after matriculation.

# **Eligibility in the Local Context (ELC)**

ELC status adds value to the UC application and is one of the factors considered when applications are reviewed. Additionally, ELC students not admitted to any of their campus choices are offered a spot at a UC campus that has space, if minimum UC requirements are met.

UC will identify the top 9 percent of WHS students based on GPA in UC-approved coursework completed in the 10th and 11th grades. To help you gauge whether ELC may apply to your senior, this year the cutoff GPA for the top 9% at WHS is 4.39. Remember, the cutoff is determined by the University of California, *not* WHS.

After you enter your coursework and grades in the UC application, UC will compare your GPA to the historic, or benchmark, GPA for Woodbridge. If you meet or exceed that GPA, you'll be designated ELC and UC will add a note to your application.

When will you find out if you're designated ELC?

After submitting the application, you can log back into your application to see whether or not you've been designated as being in the top 9 percent of your class by selecting the "View how your application is reviewed" link.

### **Guaranteed admission with the Statewide Index**

The updated Statewide Index identifies California-resident students in the top 9 percent of California high school graduates and offers these students a guaranteed space at a UC campus, if space is available.

### How will UC determine which students are in the top 9% statewide?

UC uses a formula called the Statewide Index to determine which students are in the top 9% of California high school graduates. The updated Statewide Index considers your a-g course totals and your UC GPA. UC counts your total number of UC-approved a-g courses completed and in progress/planned in 9th-12th grade and calculates your UC GPA using the a-g courses you completed between the summer following 9th grade and the summer following 11th grade. Read this information about the statewide index to determine if you're in the top 9%. Admissions updates to University of California for Fall 2023

## GPA updates related to COVID 19

- UC will continue to <u>calculate the UC GPA</u> using letter grades earned in 10th and 11th grades, including summers following 9th, 10th, and 11th grades.
- "CR / NC" and "P" / NP" grades will not be factored into the GPA calculation.
- UC-approved honors and AP classes as well as UC transferable college courses in which "CR" or "P" is earned will not receive an extra point in the GPA calculation.
- UC-approved honors and AP classes as well as UC transferable college courses in which "CR" or "P" is earned will be included in the honors tallies (total number of honors courses completed) to demonstrate rigor in the curriculum.

### Standardized Testing updates

The background: On May 21, 2020, the UC Regents unanimously voted to suspend the use of SAT/ACT requirement until 2024. This vote made several UC campuses, in effect, "test optional".

On September 1, 2020, the Alameda County Superior Court ruled that UC could not use SAT/ACT scores for admissions purposes. The UC appealed and on May 14, 2021, the court ruled with the plaintiffs. This ruling made the UC system, in effect, "test blind" for admission purposes.

### SAT/ACT scores may <u>not</u> be used for:

 Admissions: Some campuses may choose to consider your SAT II/Subject test scores and AP scores as part of their application review process. Remember, no admission decision is based on a single factor. The University of California reviews all applicants on 13 different factors ranging from GPA and number of Honors courses to special talents and abilities along with extracurricular activities, honors and awards earned within the context of one's life experiences.

### SAT/ACT scores may be used for:

- Scholarships. *Some* scholarships may include test scores as a factor in selection
- Course placement after student enrollment.

- Consider applying to Merced, Riverside, or Santa Cruz if you think you might be in the top 9% at WHS or on the statewide index.
- One online application to as many campuses as you select.
- \$70 per campus
   Fee waiver for up to 4 free campus applications is imbedded in the online application.
- Have handy: transcript(s), AP scores, social security number, or immigration status and visa information, edited PIQ responses to paste into the app, credit card.

# Application Basics continued...

- Apply for Fall 2023 as a "Freshman"
- ✓ Include a-g courses and grades from all schools attended (community college, other high schools, UC approved online classes, etc.) Use the grading system specific to that school. For WHS classes that is A,B,C,D,F even with CR/NC grades from Spring 9th grade and optional P/NP grades from 10th grade.
- Transcripts and AP scores are <u>not</u> required to be sent along with initial application although a **final** transcript and official College Board AP score report will be requested to verify the self reported information after graduation in June. <u>Be sure your self report is accurate</u>.
- Changes after submission to contact information is allowed. Changes to senior course schedule or report of low grades (below a C) must be reported. Senior grades matter!!!
- Print a copy of the completed application for your records.
- Admissions decisions will come in February/March

# Maximize your opportunities in the activities section and personal insight question responses

- **The UC application is a self advocacy application**. Provide context for your academic record, extracurricular experiences, and family situation.
- The UC understands that remote learning in Spring of 9th grade disturbed many students' academic plans and enrichment activities. They would like to know what activities *were* you able to continue with? What did you learn from these new experiences?
- Be reflective and consider your entire high school career. Focus on what you did accomplish, not necessarily opportunities that didn't come to fruition.
- The UC is interested in academic accomplishments in light of life experiences. Share those life experiences to provide context. For example, if you chose not take AP exams in the Spring of 10th grade, provide context for that decision. Share other ways you have demonstrated proficiency.

### **Personal Insight Questions**

- Required Personal Insight Questions offer 8 options. Applicants must respond to 4.
- Maximum of 350 words for each response.
- Draft responses first (20 minute time out feature)
- Answer the question(s) and emphasize insight, content, and contextual information

### **TIPS & ADVICE FOR STUDENTS FROM UC:**

- Write multiple PIQ drafts. Eliminate "fluff." No need for creative writing, just talk to us!
- Consider completing "optional" questions (i.e., parents level of education, family size, etc.) to provide greater personal context.
- Don't use the "Additional Information" box in the PIQ section to list extracurricular activities complete the activity section!
- Context matters! Tell us about your life. What courses do you have access to and why you have or haven't taken advantage of them?
- Be thorough and accurate with your grade reporting. Work from a transcript!

# **UC Scholarship Opportunities**

### **Blue and Gold Opportunity Plan**

UC's Blue and Gold Opportunity Plan will ensure that you will not have to pay UC's systemwide tuition and fees out of your own pocket if you are a California resident whose total family income is less than \$80,000 a year and you qualify for financial aid — and that's just for starters.

Blue and Gold students with sufficient financial need can qualify for even more grant aid to help reduce the cost of attending.

How to apply: FAFSA/California Dream Act Application + Cal Grant GPA Verification Form (you will be automatically considered when you submit these forms by March 2; there is no separate application for this program)

### Middle Class Scholarship Plan

Each year, the state allocates funding for the program. For UC students, the goal of this funding is to provide scholarships that help cover **up to 40% of UC's systemwide tuition and fees**. What this means for you:

<u>Make sure you apply for financial aid.</u> There are no separate forms required to apply for the Middle Class Scholarship Program, but remember — you will need to apply for financial aid every year by the March 2 deadline. If your family's income and household assets are under \$201,000 year and you qualify for this scholarship, the California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) and your UC campus financial aid office will let you know your actual scholarship amount.

California's Master Plan for higher education "established an admissions principle of universal access and choice, assigning UC to select its freshmen students from the top one-eighth (12.5%) of the high school graduating class and CSU from the top one-third (33.3%). The California Community Colleges were to admit any student capable of benefiting from instruction. The Master Plan was subsequently modified to provide that all California residents in the top one-eighth or top one-third of their high school graduating classes who apply on time be offered a place somewhere in the UC or CSU system, respectively."

"The community college transfer function is an essential component of this commitment to access. Under the Master Plan, <u>UC and CSU set aside upper division places for and give priority in the admissions</u> <u>process</u> to eligible California Community College transfer students."

# **CSU Admissions Eligibility**

First-time freshmen must meet the following eligibility requirements:

- Be a high school graduate or equivalent
- Complete the 15-unit comprehensive "a-g" pattern of college preparatory courses
- Earn the following qualifying "a-g" grade point average (GPA): <u>2.50</u> or greater "a-g" GPA for California residents and graduates of California high schools. Use this link to calculate your CSU GPA:

# California State University: Requirements Change

- CSU will consider course grades of "credit" or "pass" as fulfilling "a-g" requirements for those courses completed during winter, spring, summer or fall 2020 terms and winter, spring or summer 2021 terms.
- All other coursework must be graded and a grade of C- or better must be earn, for the course to satisfy "a-g" requirements.
- Grades of credit/pass or no credit/no pass will not be included in the calculation of high school GPA.

### **Q**: What if I have less than a 2.50 GPA? Can I still apply?

### A: It depends on the campus!!

#### Top 5 DOs and DON'Ts for Filling Out Your Freshman Application



D0 review the <u>Freshman Application Guide</u> and the <u>Fall</u> 2022 First-Time Freshman Guidance page for help filling out your application.

## DON'T 🗙

DON'T start your **application late**. Instead, take your time and submit **early** to avoid stress. Fall 2022 freshman applications open up October 1<sup>st</sup>, so feel free to get started right away!

D0 complete your **Extended Profile** correctly. Make sure you are selecting "First Bachelor's" degree. Need help? Visit the <u>Help Center</u>. The customer support team is here to help with any issues you may have.

Ready to submit? D0 first, stop and review your application carefully. After you submit, you will not be able to make changes. Be sure to check that you selected the CSU campus(es) you intended to apply to.

D0 review the Fee Waiver Checklist to see if you may be eligible for an **application fee waiver** prior to submitting. DON'T leave out your **in progress (currently taking)** high school courses. These will be used to calculate your total years earned towards the A-G requirements.

DON'T fill in your application **from memory**. Instead, be sure to have a copy of your unofficial high school transcripts to enter your courses and match A-G. Have an **official** college transcript for college credit, if applicable.

DON'T create your Cal State Apply account with an **email** you rarely use. Instead, provide an email address you check regularly since official communications about the application process are sent via email.

D0 visit the <u>Dates and Deadlines</u> page to see **what** programs are available at each CSU campus since this information can change each application cycle. DON'T enter high school courses that **do not meet an A-G** requirement. Instead, only enter high school courses that can be matched to A-G. Reminder: ALL college credit should be entered, even if not taken for A-G.

- Many college campuses offer in person and virtual tours, and in person and virtual information sessions. It is recommended that your student take a tour prior to applying to help determine if the school is a good fit.
- Remember... some Public Out of State Universities are bound to their respective state laws (e.g., requirement for % of in-state admits over out of state)

# YOUR COLLEGE LIST

- First began with a list of potential schools. On average, students are applying to 8 to 10 universities. A recommended guideline is to have :
- 2 to 3 Reach Schools (low chance of admissions) (UCLA, CAL, USC, IVY League..)
  - GPA is within striking distance of average admitted student
  - Many other factors are used in admission
- 3 to 4 Match or Target Schools (good chance of admission)
  - GPA falls within or slightly above the average admitted student
- 1-2 Safety Schools (excellent chance of admission)
  - GPA is above average admitted student
- You can usually find admitted student statistics on the college website.

# FOUR-YEAR COLLEGE ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

## Colleges Review:

- Courses
- GPA
- **Test Scores SAT/ACT** (Many schools are test optional this year. If students choose to submit test scores, they will have to send scores from the testing agency. Woodbridge does not send test scores. )
- Grades of A, B, or C required for college eligibility

## <u>Comprehensive Review</u> (more selective/competitive colleges)

- Letters of Recommendation (may be required). (If required, students can review the Letter of Recommendation packet which has detailed instructions and can be found on the student's Canvas Account. Must be accessed through the student's IUSD google drive.)
- Essays
- Extra-curricular activities
- Leadership experiences

- Community service
- Academic accomplishments
- Demonstrated Interest

# FOR GOOD MEASURE

- 1. Each school will have slightly different minimum academic requirements for admission
- 2. A good bet is to follow the guidelines for UC/CSU A-G completion
- 3. Please review freshman admission requirements to ensure they have been met
- 4. Schools vary regarding which GPA is reviewed for admission
  •Total Academic GPA 9-12 (weighted) (Recommended for Common App)
  •Total Academic GPA 9-12 (un-weighted)
  •Total GPA (weighted)
  - Total GPA (un-weighted)

Many schools will recalculate a students GPA when they apply.

# ADMISSION OPTIONS

**NON-RESTRICTIVE** application plans do not restrict students from applying to other institutions. You'll have until May 1 to consider your options and confirm enrollment. There are three application plans under **non-restrictive**:

- **Regular Decision** : Regular Decision means that you turn in your application by the college's deadline, and they let you know by a specified date.
- Rolling Admission: Schools review applications as they're submitted and make decisions throughout the admission cycle (usually within four to six weeks of submission of the application). It is usually wise to send your application as soon as possible since some colleges will fill their class by early winter
- **Early Action**: this is an "early" option: You send your application by the early deadline and the college sends you its decision earlier. Some colleges do have additional restrictions on their early action programs, though, so make sure to read carefully the instructions from each college.



There are two types of **<u>RESTRICTIVE</u>** application plans:

- 1. Early Decision: You are committing yourself to going to that school. Early Decision is for those early-bird students who already have a clear first-choice college. If you're still comparing colleges and don't want to limit your choices yet, Early Decision is not for you. Why? Early Decision is a contract between you and the college. You agree that if the college accepts you, you'll withdraw all other college applications and attend the early decision college. Because of this commitment, you can apply Early Decision to only one college.
- 2. Restrictive Early Action: This means that you apply to your school of choice and get a decision early. Be aware, though, that some schools restrict applicants from applying to any other schools early. If you go this way, you'll have until May 1 to confirm that you'll be attending.

# APPLICATION INFORMATION

### How to Apply for Private and Out of State Colleges

- Check school's website for application instructions!
- Over 1000 college and universities in the U.S. use the <u>Common Application</u> (<u>Commonapp.org</u>)
- Some schools still use their own <u>institutional applications</u> or give you a choice.
- Approximately 150 colleges and universities use the <u>Coalition Application</u> (<u>Coalitionforcollegeaccess.org</u>)



- Many applications are open now so have your student get started!
- Common App help videos are available on the students' canvas pages College Information for Seniors Tab.
- If a student uses the Common or Coalition App, counselors will send initial and mid-year transcripts.
- Transcripts can be ordered through parchment.com if additional ones are needed.

# FINANCIAL AID/COSTS

- Two people may not pay the same amount. Financial aid, scholarships or merit aid may be available.
- It is recommended to apply, no matter the "sticker price" because the bottom line, it may be affordable.
- Check the financial aid/scholarship section of websites.
   Some schools may automatically provide merit aid for good grades.
- File the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) which opens October 1st
- CSS Profile: Depends on the school
